MTV Together with NAACP to Send 17 Buses of Young People from Communities Impacted by Gun Violence Around the Country to the March For Our Lives in Washington D.C. on March 24th

MTV's New National Study "Teens React: Gun Violence and Youth Activism" Finds Nearly 6 in 10 Young People Plot Escape Plans in Public Places Due to Recent Shootings

NEW YORK--(BUSINESS WIRE)-- MTV, together with <u>NAACP Youth & College Division</u> and local youth organizations, will send 17 buses of young people from communities affected by gun violence to D.C. on Saturday for the <u>March For Our</u> <u>Lives</u>. Recognizing the immense power of youth, Jennifer Lopez, Lady Gaga, Jimmy Fallon, The Roots, Yara Shahidi, Nick Cannon, Carmelo Anthony, Pusha T, Halsey, and Chloe x Halle have joined forces with MTV and NAACP to offer support and encouragement in various ways to the young people traveling to D.C. to participate in the march. The 17 buses represent the lives lost in the Parkland shooting and the more than 17 young lives lost* to gun violence every day. The buses will transport young people from Atlanta, GA; Baltimore and Bowie, MD; Chicago, IL; Greensboro, Laurinburg, Fayetteville, NC; New Jersey; New York, NY; Philadelphia, PA; Providence, RI and Richmond, VA.

"Once again young people are at the forefront of driving change," said Chris McCarthy, President of MTV. "Today's study revealed an overwhelming 75% of teens polled are 'not going to wait until they are adults to make real political change,' and MTV is proud to amplify this youth-led activism."

"March 24 is not just another rally, it's an opportunity to support young leaders who are organizing to end gun violence and make all communities safer," said Tiffany Dena Loftin, Director of the NAACP Youth and College Division. "It's also an opportunity to mobilize young people of color. The NAACP's Youth and College Division is committed to letting policy makers and elected officials know in a powerful way, that we are prepared to exercise both our voice, and our votes on the issue of public safety."

MTV News and Social will be on the ground with live coverage from the March which will be appearing on MTV throughout the day. Additionally, Vic Mensa, who is performing at March For Our Lives, will also take over MTV's Instagram Stories during the march. The network is also developing a documentary special featuring young people from across the country who are taking action against gun violence.

MTV INSIGHTS KEY FINDINGS - "Teens React: Gun Violence and Youth Activism"

Gen Z teens have been affected by gun violence and are feeling unsafe and anxious

- More than 1 in 4 (26%) know someone who has been directly affected by gun violence at school
- 6 in 10 (59%) feel scared about violence at school
 - 63% teens of color vs 55% white teens
- **Nearly 6 in 10** (57%) say "I sometimes plot out escape plans when I'm in public places, because of shootings and events like Parkland"
 - i Increased 50% from 2013, asked in a survey conducted post-Sandy Hook (57% in 2018 vs 38% in 2013)
- 4 in 10 (40%) feel they need a bulletproof backpack in school

The majority of Gen Z teens are angry the government isn't doing enough

- Almost 7 in 10 (69%) are "angry the government hasn't done enough to prevent gun violence" 75% teens of color vs 65% white teens
- Nearly 7 in 10 (67%) are "tired of America being run by older politicians who don't care about young people"

Teens aren't sitting idly; they're planning to take action

- About 3 in 4 (74%) of teens say they're "tired of adults underestimating the political power of people my age"
- 2 in 3 (66%) agree "my generation's activism around reducing gun violence will actually push gun laws to change"
- About 2 in 3 agree (64%) "it's my generation's responsibility to take action on gun control"
- 3 in 4 (75%) of teens agree "my generation is not going to wait until we are adults to make real political change"
